




Matthew 1:18-23








Immanu-EL (the God of all Power)

According to Hugh Ross, a person confined to 4 dimensions like us humans trying to grasp the reality of a person (ie God, his Being and his power) in just the 5th dimension would entail a minimum factor of a trillion (1,000,000,000,000); in the 6th dimension add another factor of a trillion; in the 7th by another factor of a trillion, and so forth...



- If you find yourself looking down on those who are constantly "failing" in your eyes, let God's grace enable you to see how you have failed in judging others our of pride and self righteousness.




