Week 7 (February 26): Taming the Tongue James 3:1-12 Introduction

- Open your time in prayer and read the passage together.
- Give everyone 15 minutes to answer the five following questions: Write your answers after each question.
- Take one question at a time and have people share their answers.
- End your time by sharing and praying for one another.

Passage:

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. ² For we all stumble in many ways. And if anyone does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man, able also to bridle his whole body. ³ If we put bits into the mouths of horses so that they obey us, we guide their whole bodies as well. ⁴ Look at the ships also: though they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. ⁵ So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great things.

How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire! ⁶ And the tongue is a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the entire course of life, and set on fire by hell. ⁷ For every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by mankind, ⁸ but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. ⁹ With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. ¹⁰ From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so. ¹¹ Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and salt water? ¹² Can a fig tree, my brothers, bear olives, or a grapevine produce figs? Neither can a salt pond yield fresh water.

Redeemer Small Group Study Guideline

Step 1 - Begin by praying together, asking God to speak through His word.

Step 2 - Read the scripture passage out loud. Each person reading one verse at a time. See the 8 week reading schedule above.

Step 3 - On our own for 10 minutes, go back over the passage while looking for these five things:



Light Bulb:

Something that "shines" from the passage-whatever impacts most, draws attention, or peaks your interest. (These could be facts, details, figures of speech, lists, repetition, contrasts, comparisons, quotes, etc).



Question Mark:

Anything that is difficult to understand in the text, or a question you would like to ask the writer of the passage or the Lord.



Cross:

How does this passage relate to the person, nature, character or work of Jesus.



Arrow:

What is the takeaway? A personal and practical application of the text to your life. What does God want you to understand/think? What does God want you to believe? What does God want you to desire? What does God want you to do?



Text Bubble:

Who is someone you could share this truth with? (This could be yourself, a family member, friend, roommate, classmate, neighbor, co-worker, etc.) Write down the name and pray for an opportunity to share it. This might be sharing God's truth with another believer for encouragement or sharing it with a non-believer because "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ." (Romans 10:17)

Step 4 - Begin five rounds of questioning - going through each category above and giving your group time to share.

Step 5 - Pray together: Invite people to lead in prayer as they please; no one should feel pressured to pray. The prayers can highlight what was learned during the study.
